Performance against objectives

Darlington Community Safety Partnership (CSP) continues to meet both virtually via Teams and in person quarterly and delivers a range of services, projects and initiatives in support of its vision, objectives and associated plans during 2022/23.

In terms of performance, there has been an increase of 7% in the number of reported crimes (697 crimes), an increase of 1% in the number of reported crime and disorder incidents (369 incidents) and a reduction of 20% in the number of reported anti-social behaviour incidents (583 incidents) in Darlington when compared with a similar reporting period 2021/22 (1st April 2021 – 28th February 2022 compared with 1st April 2022 - 28th February 2023).

Categories of crimes showing an increase of over 10% during 2022/23 include harassment (99 offences - improved and increased recording), burglary (118 offences - significant activity and arrest/charge), theft of pedal cycle (16 offences - low level increase), shoplifting (77 offences), possession of weapons (20 offences - increased activity around stop & search and improved recording), public order (259 offences - increased and improved recording) and metal theft (9 offences - low level increase).

The town centre has recorded similar levels of crime during the same period (increase of 2 crimes), a reduction of 4% in the number of reported crime and disorder incidents (101 incidents) and a reduction of 20% in the number of reported anti-social behaviour incidents (52 incidents) when compared with a similar reporting period during 2021/22.

Categories of crimes showing an increase of over 10% during 2022/23 include sexual offences (7 offences - mainly historic), rape (1 offence), theft of pedal cycle (6 offences - low level increase) and public order (increase of 27 offences - increased and improved recording).

Performance against objectives remains a standing item on the agenda of each partnership meeting including the Darlington Community Safety Partnership, the Darlington (CSP) Multi-Agency Problem Solving Group and individual organisation "daily" tasking and coordination. Darlington CSP activity has remained focused throughout the period of reporting and supported the delivery of key achievements around the business priorities, all of which are well-evidenced in the Darlington Community Safety Partnership Plan 2021-2026 and linked documents.

The Partnership is well attended, remains focused on the threats and risk around community safety and recently reviewed membership, ownership of themes, action plans and deliverables.

To support this process, a Partnership Planning Event was held on Tuesday 14th March 2023, which provided an excellent foundation for moving-forward during 2023/24.

Amongst those matters discussed at the event were priorities, deliverables, environmental scanning, future plans and initiatives, governance, finance and risk.

Governance arrangements and the CSP Risk Register have been reviewed and approved by partners. This process involved consultation with specialist advisors in DBC Legal and Procurement.
