

As part of our pledge to tackle climate change and reduce our carbon emissions, services across the council are looking at how they can reduce the impact of the work they do.

Our highways team is using new technology, new materials and new ways of working to tackle the carbon footprint caused by road resurfacing and repairs.

Thanks to their efforts, 147 tonnes of CO2 have been saved in the last three years – that's the same as driving 882,000 miles in a diesel car!

So, what has the highways team done differently?

When a road is being resurfaced, most carbon emissions come from trucks going to and from the site, removing old material and bringing in new.

Recycling the existing road surface by breaking it up, mixing it with a small amount of new material and then putting it back down - all in one continuous process, using one machine – saves dozens of truck movements each time.

The recycling method has been successfully used on Estoril Road South, The Fairway, Fenby Avenue, Cleveland Avenue and Hewitson Road.

In the last three years, this recycling method has saved 230 truck journeys and prevented 4,000 tonnes of road material going to landfill.

Another idea, trialled last year, saw 2,780 tonnes of road materials saved from other jobs and recycled back into the carriageway on Middleton Lane, in Sadberge.

This saved 146 wagon trips in one job and was finished almost two weeks earlier than traditional methods, meaning the road was reopened sooner, so there was less disruption for residents and highway users.

We'll use the same idea again this year on another large job.

Recycling isn't suitable for all roads. Where we have to use traditional methods we've used a warm rather than hot asphalt. This leads to an 8-10% reduction in carbon emissions, with the same quality material.

After successful trials last year, we'll be using warm asphalt on all suitable surfacing schemes this year.

We also carry out repairs to footpaths and have been looking at a one material process, instead of the old two step method. This halves the time to lay a footpath, reduces emissions and means less disruption for pedestrians.

Looking after some of the most vulnerable people in our community is one of the council's most important duties.

In the first in a series of articles on adult social care, we take an in-depth look at one of the teams helping to deliver that service.

One of the many teams that makes up the council's adults services department is the Adult Contact Team (ACT).

It is made up of a range of different professionals, each committed to helping people as much as possible to build on their own strengths and networks as a means of meeting their social care needs.

The team's two main functions are:

- responding to requests for assessments of need, enquiries about safeguarding issues, advice and information about services, as well as responding to urgent or crisis situations
- a short-term casework element, enabling the provision of short-term social work for up to 16 weeks. This is for adults with a range of complex needs. The team works proactively with service users, their families, carers and other relevant professionals.

Sam Cairns, team manager: "I joined the council in 2011 as a newly qualified social worker, gaining valuable knowledge and experience in a range of areas. I have a strong passion for supporting the progression and development of others and believe in providing high challenge with high support. The council has supported me to develop and reach my goal and these values remain at the core of my approach as a manager."

Natalie Greaves, senior practitioner: "I started my career in the reablement team in 2018. This instilled in me a strength-based, person-centred approach, with a focus on helping people to live at home as independently as possible."

Heather Relph, senior practitioner: "I have more than nine years' experience working in adult social care. I have a particular interest in mental capacity and empowering adults in their own decision making."

An elderly man with dementia was referred to the team from hospital. It was not safe for him to return home, so he was discharged into a temporary 24-hour care placement whilst further assessments could be completed. A multi-agency approach was taken to support his long-term needs.

It was identified his needs could be met in an Extra Care provision, which would continue to promote his independence whilst he received necessary support. He has now settled into his new accommodation. His daughter has seen a significant improvement in her dad's wellbeing and the move has also reduced her caring responsibilities allowing them to spend more quality time together.

This enables close working relationships, which can really help to provide the support needed."



Kathryn Hardwick, a dementia adviser for the Alzheimer's Society, came up with the idea of the dementia information card which brings together advice, group activities and services' details.

Steven Winterburn, coordinator for the Youth Employment Initiative (YEI)

YEI is a programme designed to help young people in Darlington get into education, employment or training. It's been running since 2016 and I joined in 2017. It's funded by the European Social Fund and, for the last two years, our programme has been the most successful across the whole of the Tees Valley and has helped many young people into work.

No two days are ever the same. Early morning I'll update our Facebook page with work and training opportunities then drive to the Youth Hub where I may be doing financial claims, profiling, meeting an employer or checking paperwork. Sometimes I'll be helping someone find their birth certificate or open a bank account — all things that can be a barrier to finding work. Most of what I do has one underlying aim — to improve the career prospects of young people in Darlington.

Our team offers careers advice, help with applying for work and preparing for interviews and help to boost self-esteem and confidence. So far this year, I have met with EE and arranged for us to deliver a pre-contact centre course for young people, where they will be guaranteed an interview; arranged a recruitment event for Click Digital and St John of God and much more.

After lockdown we realised that seeing people face to face worked best for us, so last year we established Darlington Youth Hub. It has become a one stop shop with other agencies, including the Jobcentre and work coaches, making it easier for young people to get the help they need. We've also expanded our team so we can help even more people.

Working with young people, you get to know them, and seeing them a year or two later in the street and hearing how far they have progressed is what it is all about for me.

I have always worked in employment and training, mostly with younger people. How we work here in Darlington, with the Youth Hub, having close relations with the Jobcentre and treating each person as an individual works amazingly well – this type of success is not possible with

Dozens of door staff have received new training as part of an initiative to help make our streets safer.

Police officers from Durham Constabulary have trained over 50 security industry authorised door staff from licensed premises across the town centre in how to spot vulnerability and potential predatory behaviour, and how to take action to prevent it.

The training is one of a series of education and development programmes being carried out thanks to funding from the Home Office's Safer Streets 3 Fund, designed to help women and girls feel safer in public spaces.

More than £450,000 has been awarded to the town, which is being used to help tackle the issues raised by residents through the Call It Out survey. The survey was run by Durham Constabulary last year to find out how safe women and girls feel and identify improvements they wanted to see.

Almost 1,300 people responded to the survey, which found that women felt significantly less safe on an evening when out and about in their neighbourhood or town centre.

The findings have informed a range of initiatives led by police and the council to help make the town a safer place for everyone, which include:

 the introduction of a dedicated police patrol car in the town centre on Friday and Saturday nights to respond quickly to concerns

- improvements to street lighting as this was raised as a significant issue in the survey
- new e-bikes so police and council wardens can carry out more frequent, high visibility patrols in hard-to-reach places
- · safety and empowerment sessions
- engagement with local students
- an improved radio network for the town's Pub Watch members
- increased and broader consultation with the community.

Chief Superintendent Adrian Green, from Durham Constabulary, said: "The Safer Streets Partnership is working hard and using the funding to provide the community with improvements that make the town a better and safer place, particularly for women and girls. This ranges from providing education to young people on healthy relationships, consent and boundaries right up to improved patrol and intervention capabilities."



PLANS FOR £200M AIRPORT **BUSINESS PARK UNVEILED**

Details of the £200million airport business park set for the southside of Teesside Airport, and which will create skilled, well-paid jobs for the people of Darlington, have now been unveiled.

The original deal to buy the airport struck by Tees Valley Mayor Ben Houchen included 817 acres of developable land, giving the airport huge opportunities to drive inward investment across the whole site.

The Southside land, comprising 270 acres and running parallel to the

runway, is the largest area primed for development.

The new business park is expected to create up to 4,400 jobs when fully operational, made up of 1.9 million sq. ft of logistics, distribution, and industrial buildings, with direct access from the A67.

The first phase will see the creation of four new units along a through road, with the ability to split them into as many as ten smaller units, covering 130,000sq ft. Subsequent phases would see plots of between

one to 200 acres developed as more businesses look to base themselves at the airport.

The new 1.5km A67 link road, running direct to the southside area will lead to the creation of a new roundabout close to Wilkinson's Plant Centre.

Work is set to begin on the new road infrastructure soon. Completion is due late summer with work starting on the business park shortly after.

Local Plan adopted

Councillors have voted to adopt the Darlington Local Plan 2016-36 – a legal document setting out a path for future economic and social development across the borough.

The Local Plan has taken five years to create and was subject to four separate periods of public consultation.

A government inspector carried out a three week examination of the plan late last year and found it to be sound, saying it was justified, effective and consistent with national policy.

The plan gives the council a stronger hand when dealing with developers and provides a framework to shape and maintain control of future development around the borough.

The aim of the Local Plan is to keep Darlington as a place where people want to live, work and visit, creating opportunities for all while mitigating and adapting to climate change, protecting and enhancing the environment, heritage and green infrastructure.

The plan also sets out where future housing developments, as well as economic zones, are considered suitable and sustainable as our population grows in coming decades.

Skerningham Garden Village

- get involved with developing a design code

One of the key elements of the Local Plan is the designation of the Skerningham Garden Village, an area of land to the north of Darlington which has been earmarked for housing and community facilities.

The inspector has agreed the proposal in the Local Plan that up to 1,650 houses and facilities such as a GP surgery and schools could be built during the plan period up to 2036. Beyond that date, there is scope for additional housing.

The inspector ruled that before any developers can submit planning applications, the council must act quickly to create and adopt a design code.

We agreed with that ruling and are working with an independent organisation called desig**ne** who will work with residents over the coming months to develop a design code for Skerningham.








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What is a design code?

A design code sets out expectations about the look and feel of a development to make sure a new estate reflects local character and preferences. The design code will ensure that Skerningham Garden Village will be developed to a high-quality standard.

Once written, it will be debated by councillors, who will vote on whether to adopt the Skerningham design code as a supplementary planning document, which gives it strong legal weight and means it must be used by developers when coming up with their designs.

Who can get involved?

Anyone who lives or works in Darlington, young or old, is welcome to get involved in the development of the Skerningham design code, particularly those who live close to the area. We want to ensure the things people feel are important are in the design code, and help preserve the things they love about the area.

What can you influence?

You will be able to influence the future look and feel of buildings and green spaces in the area, making sure it ties in with existing developments while encouraging the best of modern design and build techniques. This could include looking at biodiversity and protecting existing landscapes and looking at what streets could look like to encourage outdoor play for children and activity for all residents.

The design code can also include things such as road safety and climate change features.



How we will engage with you

There will be three face to face sessions.

The first will be an initial explanatory session in Central Hall, the Dolphin Centre, on Thursday 24 March, between 5.30-7pm, with a presentation from desig**ne** and a Q&A opportunity.

There will be two follow up workshop sessions in a venue closer to Skerningham.

Electric cars are welcome in town

The new points are part of a rollout which will see chargers installed in 32 public car parks the length and breadth of the Tees Valley – boosting the number of available charging points by 75%.

Police are cracking down on anti-social behaviour caused by off-road bikes, quads and 4x4s.

New powers mean officers can seize vehicles straightaway if they are being misused and they are asking residents to help them catch offenders in the act.

Warning signs are being erected in hotspot areas and residents are being asked to report any anti-social behaviour caused by the vehicles as it happens to help identify those responsible.

The notices also cover e-scooters which are illegal to use anywhere other than private land.

Joy Allen, Police and Crime Commissioner, said: "This innovative initiative will be very much welcomed by local residents in the affected areas who have been calling for these illegally driven bikes to be confiscated immediately to prevent the drivers causing harassment, alarm and distress in their local communities as well as untold damage to community open spaces.

"I would urge anyone who knows where these bikes are being stored or who is riding them illegally to ring 101 and share vital community intelligence so we can seize the bikes and take enforcement action against the riders."

to increase security at people's properties, to increase their peace of mind. The scheme also provides outreach support to assist those who have experienced abuse to move forward with their lives."

Once someone is referred for help, a risk assessment will be completed to decide whether the Sanctuary scheme is a safe and suitable option for them.

Professionals can make referrals to the Sanctuary scheme on behalf of people needing extra security at home, with their consent.

Helping victims' voices be heard

Joy Allen, Durham Police and Crime Commissioner, welcomes some special new recruits to her team.

"After only six months in my role I appointed three new safety champions to my team to strengthen the voice of victims of crime. The new recruits, who comprise an independent domestic abuse champion, an anti-social behaviour champion and a victims champion, are working alongside me to ensure planning, policy and commissioning decisions reflect the needs and views of victims of crime.

The new recruits, who took up their posts in early January, will also ensure local victims of crime have the opportunity to engage on issues or concerns that impact them and will be responsible for ensuring that I have a greater depth of understanding of victims' experiences. This will help me prioritise resources and interventions as part of my Police and Crime Plan.

I have listened very carefully to local people when they have told me the areas they would like to see improved and this has driven the creation of these new roles. Our new champions will independently scrutinise our current provision and performance and will ensure we work much more closely with the people our services benefit making any change real and tangible.

Their appointment will also boost the way in which I hold the force to account as I will ensure that

the victims' voices are heard at the highest level. Everything I do as commissioner has to make the lives of local people — especially victims of crime and anti-social behaviour — better and safer. I can only do that by listening to and involving the people who need and benefit from that help."

Dame Vera Baird, the Victims' Commissioner for England & Wales, said: "I have been encouraging all PCCs to appoint local victims' champions – dedicated professionals committed to deepening the understanding of victim needs and ensuring that the victim's voice is heard in

"It's great to see that this vision is becoming a reality in Durham. I look forward to engaging with these champions and I hope this will be a model for PCCs across England & Wales to emulate."
