Don't Contribute to the Problem

Mark's usual spot was Commercial Street car park, close to the pay station. He was there for a few hours most days, whatever the weather, sitting on an old blanket.

He would say how he had been abused as a child, abused by his family, and had been sleeping rough for months because no one would help him. All he wanted was some money to buy a hot drink, some food, or the cost of a bus ticket to somewhere he knew he could stay – just small change to help him out.

But the truth was Mark was addicted to heroin and needed the money to feed a £50 a day habit.

Today Mark is clean, he's reunited with his family and his life is good. Talk to him now and he'll tell you how grateful he is to those who supported him through his recovery and encouraged within him the strength to change. He is grateful to his family for taking him back (he never was abused) and is grateful to all those who did not give him money when he asked for it, choosing instead to give to a charity.

Because YOU said 'NO'

 the money that sustained and deepened Mark's addiction stopped flowing

Because YOU said 'NO' - Mark could not buy enough to overdose, so didn't become one of the 5,000+ victims of drug-poisoning each year in the UK

Because YOU said 'NO' - Mark faced the destructive reality of addiction, and realised it couldn't go on

Because YOU said 'NO' - he abandoned his spot in Commercial Street, so people who felt intimidated by him felt a lot safer

Because YOU said 'NO' - he is no longer out in all weathers begging, so is healthier and has regained his self-esteem

Because YOU said 'NO' - Mark is no longer taunted, threatened and kicked

Because YOU said 'NO' - Mark is now clean, stable, and has a future.

In Darlington, a multi-agency partnership is working to help people like Mark. Support is offered on a daily basis, with the guiding principle that whatever we do is in the person's best interests, including any enforcement action by police. By addressing the needs of those who beg and because of your help, the number of people begging in Darlington is very low compared to four years ago.

Anne-Marie Curry is the new mayor, taking over the ceremonial role as Darlington's first citizen from Cyndi Hughes.

Jonathan chairs cabinet, the council's main policy-making body.

He has appointed Andy Keir as deputy leader of the council and Mike Renton as portfolio holder for stronger communities. Jonathan said: "My first few weeks as leader have been a real whirlwind, starting with the wonderful Platinum Jubilee celebrations. There's hardly been a moment to catch my breath, but that's just how I like it."

Anne-Marie has carried out dozens of engagements since becoming mayor, meeting people from all walks of life.

She said: "It's a real honour to be appointed mayor and I look forward to meeting as many people as possible over the coming year."

Businesses across Darlington are celebrating after being recognised with national and international awards



Bakerman

Founded in 2020 by Dan Booth, Bakerman has proved a huge hit with customers, who often queue to buy fresh-baked from his shop in Clark's Yard.

Entering two categories in the Britain's Best Loaf competition, held annually at the NEC in Birmingham, Bakerman won both - Sourdough with Other Ingredients with their parmesan and black pepper sourdough and Innovation with a turmeric, red onion and nigella seed sourdough.

And, in a clean sweep, they were also named as the overall winner across six categories to take home the title of Britain's Best Loaf.



The Little Quaker Distillery

Also based in Clark's Yard, The Little Quaker Distillery was opened in April 2021 by husband and wife team Paul and Leanne Colman after starting a micro-distillery in an old wash house at the bottom of the garden during lockdown.

The business was named Gin Distillery of the Year by Corporate LiveWire after being nominated by a customer. The judges were impressed by the Colmans' use of technology to connect with customers during the pandemic and their move from trade to retail. The business has also won gold and silver awards at the London Spirits competition, a silver in the USA Spirits Awards and gold and silver in the European Spirits Awards.

In recent editions, we've introduced you to the adult contact team (ACT) and the responsive integrated assessment care team (RIACT), which both form important parts of the adult social care service.

This time, we're putting the occupational therapy (OT) and sensory impairment team in the spotlight - to give you an insight into what the team does and how it may be help you or someone you know.

The OT team supports people with any concerns they have about daily living ranging from complex neurological conditions or palliative care to general age-related frailty. The team of 11 aims to keep people in their own homes by providing equipment they may need to remain or gain independence. Equipment may include bathing aids, or minor/major adaptations such as grab rails, ramp access, stairlifts, wet rooms and specialist toilets. The OT team also works alongside other council departments to help clients with other aspects of their life including housing needs specific to their medical requirements. Some people may require a major adaptation to their home like an extension – such work is funded by the means tested disabled facility grant. Minor adaptations to the home or equipment are free of charge.

Our team is like a family, we support each other just like we support our clients.

Team manager, Christine Thompson, said: "Our team is like a family, we support each other just like we support our clients. The issues we deal with daily can be tough, we may be supporting an individual to return home after a significant injury and a prolonged stay in hospital.

"The provision of appropriate equipment and adaptations such as ramped access and a ground floor bathroom and bedroom can allow someone who has recently become a wheelchair user to return home and regain independence, this is life changing. Helping to put such things in place for people is really fulfilling, you can see the difference it makes to their physical and mental wellbeing."

If you have a visual or hearing impairment, the sensory service may be able to support you. Consisting of a hearing impairment officer, community support officer and a visual impairment officer, the team aims to improve a person's quality of life and their independence.

The team can make referrals to hearing support groups and Guide Dogs for the Blind which can help build confidence and encourage clients to get out into the community. The sensory team also organises social groups and activities to prevent isolation and supports people to make new friends.

Equipment such as pagers, doorbell sensors, smoke alarms, baby alarms, alarm clocks and TV and telephone aids are available depending on need, at no cost to the client. Concessionary bus travel, support with daily living tasks and information about exemptions such as VAT and TV licences and blue badges is also available.

David Hugill, community hearing support worker, has a hearing impairment and is supported in his role by Jayne Irving, communication support worker.

David explains: "It is a privilege to use my disability to help people in the community. I want to encourage anyone with an impairment to get out there, live your life and enjoy every day. There is nothing to stop you, especially when you have teams like ours to support you!"

There are currently two local groups that run weekly for the deaf community.

The over 55 group is on every Monday noon—3pm at 87 Park Place. Visitors can enjoy a cuppa, socialising, bingo, and raffles,

The deaf meet-up group takes place on a Thursday at the Havelock Centre, 34 Katherine Street from 1pm-4pm. This fun group is for people of any age to enjoy games, parties, refreshments and general socialising. Anyone learning British Sign Language is also welcomed to come along to practise their skills.

Councillor Lorraine Tostevin cabinet member for adults, said: "The adults team is an integral part of our communities, they are involved in many aspects of our daily living, helping those who are unwell or ageing to be independent and live life as fully as possible despite their ailments. I encourage anyone who would like advice or support to remain living in their own home while managing an illness to contact the team. Each team is friendly, experienced and ready to help."

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BRAKES ON NUISANCE OFF-ROAD BIKES



The council has a zero tolerance approach to off-road vehicles causing a nuisance in our communities.

We have been working closely with Durham Constabulary and other partners to put the brakes on off-road drivers and tackle the nuisance cause by bikers, quads and 4x4s.

Operation Endurance, run by the police, has seen the introduction of new warning signs displayed in hotspots across the borough. Section 59 notices highlight new police powers to seize vehicles on the spot, rather than having to issue warnings in the first instance. This has already seen a number of nuisance off-road vehicles seized in recent months.

We are working with police to raise awareness of this successful scheme and we would encourage you to report any incidents as they happen to help identify those responsible.

We're celebrating 10 years of Supported Lodgings this year! This is a vital service that helps young people from a range of care backgrounds with the next stages of life, and you could be a part of it.

When young people in care reach 16, there are options available for their next step in life. They may be able to stay with their care placement or leave the care system altogether and find a place of their own to start living independently. However, if they feel as though they need a little support to boost their confidence before living alone, they can move into Supported Lodgings.

Supported Lodgings is for people aged 16 to 21 who have previously been looked after, either in foster or residential care, to help them make the transition to independent living. The young person lives with someone, who can provide them with a room in their home; along with guidance and advice to help develop their skills. This could include teaching the young person how to cook, do laundry, budget or find a job – or even just offering them some emotional support.

10 years of Supported Lodgings

We recently caught up with Carol, one of our lovely, long established Supported Lodgings providers to find out how she finds the experience. She told us:

"I read a magazine article about Supported Lodgings around seven years ago which prompted me to find out more.

I like to think I am a caring, compassionate person and I had a spare room in my home, so I applied and have never looked back. The council supported me every step of the way, giving me access to other Supported Lodgings providers and help and training where it was needed.

I have many wonderful memories from the years of providing support for young people but, above all, being appreciated and having the chance to nurture a young person to develop into a confident caring adult is so rewarding.

If you are thinking of becoming a Supported Lodgings provider, please find out if it's for you – your help makes such a massive difference – not only to the young people whose lives you help, but to yours too."

While you don't need any special skills or qualifications to be a Supported Lodgings provider, you must be willing to help a young person on their journey. Having a sense of humour and enjoying young people's company can help too! However, the team provides lots of training opportunities to help you feel confident and ready to take on this new role.

If your application is successful, you'll be matched to a young person and receive a weekly allowance to help you cover any costs.

We have a team of professionals who would love to hear from you and will train and support you every step of your way.

A lesson in water safety




Sarah-Jayne Sams knows only too well the importance of learning to swim and staying safe in the water, having nearly drowned when she was 14.

Now working as a swim teacher and trainer assessor for lifequards at the Dolphin Centre, Sarah-Jayne teaches others this vital life skill and has been visiting primary schools to highlight the dangers of water and how to stay safe to pupils.

"When I was 14, I had a bad experience in the sea, I was with a group of friends when one of them got into trouble in a rip tide," explains Sarah-Jayne. "I went to help and managed to get her to where she could stand, but I got sucked back in and was stuck under the water, even though I was a strong swimmer and had done a few years of life saving. All I remember from the day is a burning sensation when the water was going down my throat, then wanting to go to sleep - I woke up in hospital with a very sore throat and sore ribs.

"So the water safety talks are very important to me, if I can help educate children in water safety it will hopefully help save their lives."

We have also been running a programme of extra sessions in the pool to help improve children's swimming skills after lessons were postponed during the pandemic.



Full steam ahead for rail heritage plans PARLINGTON BOTOLISH COUNCIL

Plans for a major new rail attraction at the Head of Steam museum have taken a major step forward thanks to a £300,000 Arts Council England grant.

Work began on the new attraction - part of our rail heritage quarter - earlier this year. It will be at the heart of the 2025 bicentenary celebrations for the Stockton & Darlington Railway, the world's first steam-powered passenger railway.

Also supported by £20million of funding from the Tees Valley Mayor and Combined Authority, essential improvements will be carried out on several historically significant buildings on the site, linking them together to create a cluster of attractions including the Skerne Bridge, the oldest working railway bridge in the world.

Opening in 2024, the attraction will feature a café and shop, show field, a new live engineering building alongside temporary exhibition space, archive, and extended car parking.

The award from Arts Council England will help fund exciting virtual reality experiences to help bring history to life, a new immersive ride and new railway-themed play areas. Darren Henley, chief executive, Arts Council England, said: "World class creativity and culture needs a resilient and sustainable infrastructure to allow it to flourish. With these investments in the buildings, equipment, and digital systems of cultural organisations across England, we are helping to secure the future of that infrastructure and making sure that people from every part of the country can continue enjoying all the benefits it delivers for years to come."

Once reopened, the museum will offer an incredible experience for visitors and will breathe new life into an area that was once at the forefront of world rail engineering.



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The high cost of fly-tipping

Fly-tip at Greenwell Steet

Fly-tipping is not only a blight on our environment but also a drain on the council's limited resources, with around £260,000 a year spent on clearing fly-tips across the borough.

It's an issue we're working hard to tackle and our civic enforcement officers will always investigate fly-tips and take action against those responsible where they can.

In two recent cases, two men were ordered to pay fines and costs running into hundreds of pounds.

George Hall, 31, of Hundens Lane, was fined £800 and ordered to pay £520 costs and £80 victim surcharge, after admitting he failed to dispose of waste correctly and two offences of failing to assist inquiries relating to three separate fly-tipping incidents.

Kieron Calvett, of Harris Street was also fined £400 and ordered to pay £150 costs and £40 victim surcharge after pleading guilty to being in control of a vehicle that was involved in fly-tipping.

It's important to remember that if you pay someone to remove your rubbish it's your legal duty to make sure it's disposed of properly – if it's dumped you could be fined even if you paid someone in good faith! Always check the person has a waste carrier licence, issued by the Environment Agency, and ask for a waste transfer note. You can check they are licensed at environment.data.gov.uk/public-register

Also, take a photo of the vehicle and its registration and ask which waste disposal facility they are taking your rubbish to. Most household items such as furniture, cookers, rugs, furnishings, electrical items and toys, can be left at the tip for free – find out more at www.darlington.gov.uk/tip

Do you know the symptoms of dementia?

With dementia diagnosis rates at a five-year low, it's little surprise that the Alzheimer's Society's latest campaign seeks to address this worrying trend.

The pandemic has played its part in driving the numbers down, but the charity says confusion about the symptoms is also a major factor.

In a recent survey of people with dementia, commissioned for Dementia Action Week, more than 40% of respondents from the North East said they delayed getting a diagnosis because they assumed the symptoms they were experiencing were a natural part of ageing.

Dementia is a group of symptoms, caused by different diseases that damage the brain and there is currently no cure.

Getting a diagnosis of dementia can be daunting, but there are ways to live well with dementia which is why getting help early is so important.

Concessionary travel changes

Bus passengers using a concessionary pass will be able to travel for a flat fare before 9.30am after a deal was struck with bus companies.

Working in partnership with bus operators and the Tees Valley Combined Authority, a new offer is being launched to improve services. Concessionary pass holders will be able to travel anywhere in the borough, and the wider Tees Valley, for just 30p before 9.30am.

Until now, concessionary bus pass holders could not benefit from their pass until after 9.30am – the time set by the Government – and had to pay full price to travel before 9.30am. Under the new arrangements, the flat fare of 30p will start each day from the first service offered until 9.30am. Travel with a concessionary bus pass is free between the hours of 9.30am and 11pm Monday to Friday and all day on weekends and bank holidays.

The move brings Darlington into line with the rest of the Tees Valley, where a deal was already in place for pre-9.30am travel.

Concessionary passes are those available to people of pension age or who meet the national criteria for a travel disability.

Two road improvement schemes that aim to make it safer for children to walk, scoot or cycle to school will be carried out this summer.

The school safety schemes, on Whitby Way, outside the rear entrance to Mount Pleasant Primary School, in Branksome, and Roundhill Road, close to Hurworth Primary School, will install safe crossing points for pedestrians and introduce traffic calming measures.

In both areas the speed limit will be reduced to 20mph.

The two areas were identified as part of the Safe Route to School Programme, which aims to create a safer and more convenient highway network around schools.

Work to carry out the improvements is already underway in Whitby Way, with changes and improvements to the footpaths. Three speed tables, which are raised areas in the carriageway that will also act as pedestrian crossing points, will be installed during the school summer holidays. The road will be closed while the work is carried out – local residents will be informed of the arrangements before the work starts.

The improvements in Whitby Way will also see a redundant access point across the footpath removed with new verge and footway installed and a proper footpath to replace a dirt track shortcut to the convenience store.

In Hurworth, a speed table crossing point will be installed during the summer holidays. This will require a road closure, which will be signed before the work starts.

Summer programme of roads resurfacing

An eight-week programme of micro asphalting will take place around the borough during August and September.

Micro asphalting is a new thin surface laid over the top of the existing road surface to seal and protect it.

It's a cost-effective and quick way of extending the life of a road surface, repairing minor damage and preventing potholes from forming.

The process is weather dependent so residents of affected streets will be told by the site team when work is to take place.

In the first week or so after it's laid, the new surface won't look great - there is a lot of loose material that will be swept up as part of the works.




Prostate Cancer - get tested

Golf buddies and Lions Club members David Simmons and Richard Western are urging men to get tested for prostate cancer to ensure early diagnosis.

David, 75, explained: "I didn't have any symptoms, but I requested a free home test kit promoted by the Lions Club and within a few days I got a letter advising me to contact my GP as I had a high Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) level. It was the same situation for Richard.

"I was referred to a specialist for more tests and prostate cancer was confirmed. In May 2021 I started radiotherapy and am now continuing with medication and awaiting a follow up with my oncologist. Thanks to the test, and the care from NHS, it's being treated. Richard is going through similar treatment now and we'd urge others, whether they have any symptoms or not, to get tested."



For 25 years Darlington Lions Club has run a second-hand book shop in Houndgate Mews, with donations from local residents. It has raised thousands of pounds for local charities and since 2020 the club has supported free home PSA testing kits.

Another piece of the puzzle at Teesside Airport's terminal is now in place – with the new Skybar now welcoming its first customers.

Darlington Borough Council Leader Jonathan Dulston cut the ribbon to officially launch the new venue which will be accessible to everyone, regardless of whether they are catching a flight or not.

The scheme has seen ageing office space next to the security area landside transformed to create the bar, with an adjacent atheight viewing platform due to be completed later this year.

The bar has great views right across the runway to give passengers and public the chance to see, in comfort and style, the growing number of flights coming in and out of Teesside.

We're already seeing more and more people from Darlington that aren't even flying pop into our Landside Café, and this will be another draw. Anyone who makes a purchase in the Skybar will also receive two hours of free parking. Designed by Darlington-based architects Corstorphine & Wright, work has been carried out by local firms Wharton Construction, 186 Property Solutions and ADL Developments, all of which were involved in the terminal's wider multimillion-pound redevelopment.

We've been making headway on plans for the airport's £200million Business Park, with work now under way on its new link road, due to be complete next spring.

Construction crews have been working since May to strip soil for the 2km road, which will run from a new roundabout close to Wilkinson's Plant Centre on the A67 to the under-development business park. When operational, the logistics, distribution and industrial space is expected to create up to 4,400 jobs.

Work Set to Begin on Draken's New Hangar

One business already based at our airport has recently also showed even more confidence in our base.

Aviation services and technology firm Draken Europe is set to begin work on its new airport hangar after plans were given the green light.

The company currently maintains a fleet of five specially modified Dassault Falcon jets at its base at the airport, and recently took delivery of its first Alca L-159E "Honey Badger" advanced combat jets as part of a new contract.

It is now set to build a second state-ofthe-art hangar measuring almost 5,000sq ft alongside its existing unit, to house the aircraft and support the critical role the firm plays in training combat pilots from the Royal Air Force, United States Air Force and other NATO member states.

The move will create up to 30 new jobs, with the first advertised in April.

It's proved to be a great success in other areas and we'll be keeping an eye on how effective it is here.





Demolition work on the former Sports Direct building has taken place - creating space for new investment in the heart of the town centre.
