

Climate change... how are we doing?

With record breaking temperatures recently, now is the time to tackle climate change.

In 2019 we made a pledge to become carbon neutral by 2050 and, almost a year ago, we set out a detailed action plan on how we will achieve this. Here's how we're getting on:

We said we'd reduce our reliance on fossil fuels



We have added extra solar panels to the Town Hall roof, tripling our capacity to generate electricity for our own use.

We said we would plant 10,000 trees




Since 2015 we have planted 24,577 trees.

We said we would improve our council homes



We are developing a housing and climate change strategy.

We said we'd improve our fleet



We have bought 17 electric vehicles and have plans for more.

We said we would improve the energy efficiency of our buildings



We have successfully bid for government grant funding for work on our buildings and almost 900 properties across the Town.

We said we would encourage bus companies to upgrade their fleet



We are working across the Tees Valley to develop a bus service improvement plan. If funding bids are successful, the region will be one of the first in the UK to have an entirely zero emission local bus fleet.

We said we would train our staff



79% of our staff have completed climate change training and information has been sent to councillors.

We said we would signpost businesses to information on how they can adapt



We have published a business resilience manual to help guide businesses as they work to become more green.

We said we would develop a climate change action plan



Our plan, with nearly 200 actions, was published last October. An independent benchmark review has scored us well above the national average.

We said we would update our governance procedures



Climate change is now a standing item on the economy and resources scrutiny committee agenda.



Bridging the gap

A permanent home has been found for a lasting memorial to a bridge-building business that closed in 2021 after 144 years of trading.

A red model bridge that used to stand at the entrance to the factory, in Yarm Road, will have a new permanent home at Cleveland Bridge Social Club, in Neasham Road. The news was revealed at a recent reunion for former staff.

The social club will also be home to two memorial plaques that commemorate workers from Cleveland Bridge lost in wartime.

Arguably one of the greatest bridge manufacturers in history, the company's legacy lives on through the role it played in structures such as Sydney Harbour Bridge, the Wembley arch and, closer to home, the Middlesbrough Transporter Bridge.

It's important that we keep the memory of Cleveland Bridge alive and we felt the social club was the right home for the model bridge, along with the memorial plaques.

We are pleased to have played a part in keeping that heritage and history in Darlington for future generations to learn about.





Work is well under way on the next phase of the major redevelopment of the market.

Due to be completed well before Christmas, the makeover will create new jobs and includes a new basement bar, as well as a café and revamped shop fronts and entrances.

The work will be carried out with minimal disruption to shoppers and traders, with the market remaining open for business as usual throughout.

BUILDING DEMOLITION STARTS FOR STATION TRANSFORMATION

Work is now under way to demolish the first buildings alongside Darlington railway station, paving the way for its £100million-plus redevelopment.

Local firm Thompsons has been carrying out a "soft strip" of properties to the east of the station over the past weeks, removing any remaining contents and all non-structural elements of the interior and exterior. as well as ensuring the utilities are no longer connected.

I previously provided £25million for this massive, transformative project and now, in 2022 our year of construction, we are demolishing to deliver.

Heavy demolition will now follow the soft strip in this all-important next step in the station's overhaul - a major building block for a fast, reliable and smooth rail service for the whole of the region. As **Darlington Borough Council takes** possession of further properties, this process will continue ahead of the new build's start later this year.

The space to the east is earmarked to become a station extension. with the old and new sites linked by a bridge joining the historic train shed with the modern facility.

The redevelopment includes a multi-storey car park, transport interchange and gateway entrance tying the station even more closely with the opportunities at



Central Park, New platforms will accommodate current and future services to ensure the town and wider region have the excellent transport links local people rightfully demand and deserve.

An upgrade to the Victoria Road entrance and car park pick-up and drop-off points on the western side of the station is also planned, alongside new road layouts, wider pavements and improvements to walking and cycling access. These will improve the route to the exciting investments in the town centre and the Darlington Economic Campus.

This will breathe new life into the station and its surroundings, unlock more capacity for faster and more reliable local and national services and give the people and businesses of Darlington the rail links they've been crying out for.

AVIATION FIRM PLANS MAJOR AIRPORT INVESTMENT

A global aviation firm based at Teesside Airport has shown further confidence in our airport and our region, with plans to invest up to £25million at its base there.

Willis Lease Finance Corporation, along with its subsidiary Willis Aviation Services, is currently working on the planning process for a new aircraft maintenance facility and has taken over operations of the airport's existing Jet Centre.

The plans could create 200 good-quality, well-paid jobs.

It is setting out to build maintenance hangars on 13 acres of land which would have become 350 homes had I not saved the airport from closure and brought it into public ownership.

It will improve the Jet Centre offering a full range of ground handling services – and expand its aircraft maintenance, storage

and disassembly capabilities. The land also forms part of the Teesside Freeport, the UK's largest and first operational Freeport, one key reason why Willis is beginning the process.

Our routes and summer holiday flights are hugely important for our airport, but it's these multimillion-pound private sector investments that will truly secure its future.



Throughout each edition of One Darlington, we've been getting to know the adult social care team to understand which services make up the team and how they help our communities. So far, we've spoken to the adult contact team, the responsive integrated assessment care team (RIACT) and the occupational therapy and sensory impairment team. This edition, we're meeting the ongoing assessment and intervention team.

Known as OAIT, the team comprises of 15 social workers and are based in the Town Hall. The team provides social work assessments and support and intervention for adults who have a range of physical, sensory and/or mental health impairments. Some of the daily cases the team will deal with include health care assessments, initial enquires for safeguarding, crisis intervention work, mental capacity and best interest assessments, court of protection referrals and reports, and residential and nursing assessments.

Another element to OAIT is working with the families and carers of those being supported to help them understand their loved ones needs so they can better support them if needed. The team also works with a variety of other professional services across the region to ensure the needs of the client are met. The goal of the service is to maximise a person's independence which often involves extensive work with occupational therapists, hospitals and doctors' surgeries, housing providers, and community-based services. By working together with other agencies, the support not only helps

develop the client's personal strengths but also expand their network of help to prevent, delay or reduce the need for long term intervention.

Team manager, Olivia Johnson said: "We care immensely about the people we support and I am very proud of that. Our job allows us to see the difference we can make to people's everyday lives. Over time we hope they will become more confident, motivated and recognise their strengths and, most importantly, be happier. Promoting the wellbeing of the people we support is the most rewarding part of the job and why we want to help in our communities."

Councillor Lorraine Tostevin, cabinet member for adult social care, said: "We are incredibly lucky to have such a valuable service in our communities and with such a dedicated team. All our adult social care teams are vital in Darlington and without them, recovering from a significant injury or illness with the right support or managing in your own home and maintaining your independence as we grow older, may not be an option for some. I would like to thank the teams for their hard work and commitment, their roles really do make an incredible difference to many, many people and their families."

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Getting Bob back on his feet





Meet Bob, the 78-year-old who was once a nurse and now lives alone with dog Judy, after his wife passed away four years ago. As the years have gone on, Bob and his family began to see signs of a deterioration in his mental capacity, with very low mood, feeling socially isolated and a decline in his ability to manage at home alone, Bob was diagnosed with Alzheimer's dementia and depression.

A referral was made to our adult social care team who, alongside a mental health nurse, assessed Bob's needs for support. After understanding Bob's decline, his diagnosis, and the struggles he faced, a care plan was put into place to assist him with tasks around his home, making meals, taking medication safely, integrating him into the community and monitoring his welfare.

The ultimate goal of the care plan was for Bob to have a better quality of life, to be back in control and able to make decisions. It also aimed to help him engage with people, be more independent and do things he once enjoyed.

Working effectively with other agencies in the town is vital to a successful outcome for people like Bob. Each service involved in a care plan brings another element of support to ensure needs are met and that family feel confident in the care their loved one is receiving.

The adult social care team supported Bob to engage with a local charity who could help with walking his beloved dog, Judy. The team encouraged Bob to attend pottery classes which was a big step after years of isolation – and Bob went on to lead the sessions!

The adult social services team also supported Bob's family to understand his diagnosis and how dementia had impacted their father and grandad. As well as regular visits to his home, help to manage jobs around the house, help with meals and nutrition and emotional support.

Bob received a combination of support from professional services such as the adult social care team and the NHS as well as voluntary services in the town such The Cinammon Trust and Age UK.

Fast forward to today and Bob's mental health has improved a lot. The services involved in his care have noticed an improvement in his depression and moods. Bob has said he recognises that his quality of life has improved, he appreciates the new things he now gets involved in and is grateful for the support.

Bob added that he now feels empowered to make decisions about how to take his life forward and hopes to move into a smaller house with Judy at some point in the future.

Cases like Bob's are common in Darlington and many people are unsure of how they can get help and may struggle on themselves. Transforming North

Exciting plans to regenerate Northgate, one of Darlington's most historic areas, have been revealed.

Improved housing, urban green space and opening up access to the banks of the River Skerne are all part of the Connecting Northgate project.

Northgate is one of the town's key gateways, but the ward is also one of our most deprived. The Connecting Northgate project aims to improve the lives and opportunities of residents living in the area, while also securing the future of key heritage assets and supporting the development of the £35m Rail Heritage Quarter at the Head of Steam Railway Museum.

Funding for the planned works will come as part of the wider £23.3m secured from the government's Towns Fund, which also includes projects in the town centre and Victoria Road. The council has also made a £20m bid to the government's Levelling Up Fund, which will

focus on Northgate and transport improvements on the busy A68 commuter route.

The first small step in the Northgate project is the purchase of a derelict plot of land in Garden Street. This was part of the Pease family gardens, most of which is now covered by a car park and other modern development. In the short term the land will be opened up as a community garden, with longer term plans to include it in the wider regeneration of the area.







"We know most dog owners are responsible and clean up after their pets and we thank them for everything they do. Sadly, there are those who don't, and this campaign targets those people to educate them and prosecute if they continue to offend."

The message is simple – bag it and bin it! If you don't, you could be fined up to £1,000.

Could you be a school admission appeal panel member?



School admission appeal panel member, Esme Mason

We need people to join us as school admission appeal panel members – could it be vou?

What is a school admission appeal panel member?

A school admission appeal panel member considers cases of both the person appealing and the admission authority, when a child doesn't receive the school place they requested, and comes to a considered, fair, independent conclusion.

Panel members work on a voluntary basis. Due to the number of appeals varying from year to year, you will be contacted as and when required. You don't need any special qualifications, just the quality to be fair and considerate in decision making.

We caught up with one of our longest serving school admission appeal panel members, Esme Mason, and asked her a few questions to highlight the great work panel members do.

How long have you been a school admissions panel member?

For more than 20 years.

What attracted you to the role?

I had just left a full time job and was working part time. I felt I needed a fresh challenge.

What duties do you carry out?

I listen to, and read, information relating to school admission cases from schools and parents and then consider the information and make decisions on the strength of the reasons put forward. A typical case would be that the school is full, but the parents believe it would be the best place for their child.

What kind of issues have you dealt with?

I have dealt with all kinds of issues. Parents offer explanations such as house moves, reasons for late applications, and having another child already in the school.

What do you love best about the role?

I like to think I have done my best to help someone else. Not all appeals are successful, but I do try to reach the best outcome.

What type of person do you think is best suited to the role?

People from all walks of life are panel members. I have worked with driving instructors, paramedics, and retired office staff. You need to be sympathetic and be able to weigh up the facts and make sound decisions. It can be difficult at times, but it is always rewarding.

We all have mental wellbeing in the same way we have physical wellbeing and some days we feel better than others.

Sometimes we find it hard to talk about our mental health, we don't like to admit we feel a little down or not quite ourselves, yet we will freely tell people when we have a headache or are feeling under the weather.

World Mental Health Day, on October 10, is an ideal opportunity to talk about our mental wellbeing, tell someone how you feel and ask someone how they feel, really feel. Make time to talk to a neighbour, workmate, or someone you see in a shop, on the bus or going about your day.

Say hello with a smile to someone you pass in the street, and compliment people when you can. If you are feeling not quite yourself or your mood is low, be as open as you can to a friend, colleague, or your family GP and tell them how you are feeling. Talking can be the first step to feeling better.

It is important to ensure good mental wellbeing as well as physical wellbeing. We have begun to

better understand and accept mental health and wellbeing and, although sadly, there is stigma still associated with mental wellbeing issues, as we understand more, the stigma fades.

It really is OK not to be OK. We are all likely to feel lonely, down, not quite ourselves at some point in our life and that's not unusual. Don't be afraid to admit it, talk about how you feel, it's nothing to be ashamed of – the more we are open about it, the better the chances we have of getting support and feeling better sooner.

We can all feel lonely, bereft, worried, it's not just the elderly living alone – many children feel lonely and tell us it affects their mental wellbeing. Don't suffer in silence, don't let your loved ones suffer in silence, reach out and help yourself and others on the road to recovery as soon as you can.

Whatever your age, wherever you live, make time to chat to help improve the mental wellbeing of people around you. You may benefit from meeting new people, through sports clubs, drop-ins, lunch clubs, mums' groups, men's groups, arts groups to name but a few. Find out more at www.livingwell.darlington.gov.uk

A former street sweeper, Peter worked for the council for 35 years before his retirement in 2001 but he continued cleaning the streets of the town he loved so much.

Here we celebrate the life of a man whose efforts made such a difference and who always had a smile for those he met while out and about.

Julie Whitehouse, a close friend of Peter's, said: "Peter was one of a kind, a true gentleman and a friend to many.

"Born in the Beverley area, Peter and his family moved to Darlington when he was a teenager. He worked for the Co-op delivering milk and as a kitchen porter at the Imperial Hotel before finding his true vocation as a street sweeper for the council.



"Peter was well respected and quite a celebrity, having made several newspaper and TV appearances. He won awards for his work in the local community and in 2018 received the Pride of the North East award at a starstudded event in Newcastle.

"He enjoyed a simple, happy, independent life, living amongst the people who cared for him in Dinsdale Crescent. He passed away peacefully at home, exactly as he wanted.

Skerningham – the next steps

There's still time to get involved and have your say on the design code for Skerningham Garden Village. Earlier this year, more than 200 people attended workshops and events to give their valuable input into developing a design code for the area - thank you if you were one of them.

A design code sets out expectations about the look and feel of a development to make sure a new estate reflects local character and preferences; it will ensure that Skerningham Garden Village will be developed to a high-quality standard. Ideas and discussions included looking at access, cycling provision, the ecology of the area and how green spaces will be included in any development.

These ideas have helped to shape the design code and it is hoped that a full report will be put before cabinet this month (6 September). If agreed, the design code will go to a month-long public consultation ending early October. This will give you the chance to take a look at the code and have your say.



The code will be revised after the consultation and put before the council's cabinet again for agreement later in the year. Once agreed, it will become a legally enforceable document and part of the planning policy for Skerningham.

Check your voter registration details

Luke Swinhoe, electoral registration officer, said: "It's important you respond as soon as possible, so we can make sure we have the correct details on the electoral register for every address in Darlington. To make sure that you are able to have your say at the parish and council elections next year, simply check the form when it arrives

and respond as soon as you can. If you are not currently registered, your name will not appear on the form.

"If you want to register, the easiest way is online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote or we can send you information explaining how to do it in the post. Either way, you will still need to complete the form and send it back to us."

If you have recently moved it is especially important you keep an eye out for the canvass form and check the details.
