

WE WANT TO HEAR FROM YOU ABOUT ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR IN YOUR COMMUNITY.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) is defined as action that causes harassment, alarm or distress to individuals or a community. It comes in a variety of forms, from the noise and disruption caused by off-road bikes or rowdy behaviour in the streets, to repeated fly-tipping or inconsiderate behaviour to neighbours.

We are asking you to report anti-social behaviour, every time it happens. We want you to feel empowered to report behaviour that is causing you a problem, to help our civic enforcement officers and the police clampdown on the issue.

Although a report may not result in an officer turning up immediately, every contact about ASB is logged and mapped by the team, which allows resources, whether that be officers or technology, to be used where they are needed most.

We want to make sure you know how to report different types of anti-social behaviour, as some incidents will be dealt with by our civic enforcement team, rather than the police.

Our webpage dedicated to ASB has been updated and includes detailed information about what is anti-social behaviour as well as the right ways to report it online, anonymously if you want, or over the phone.

Full steam ahead for Rail Heritage Quarter!

The next stage of the creation of the Rail Heritage Quarter is underway - the Head of Steam Railway Museum has closed its doors until summer 2024 as work begins to transform it into a state of the art visitor attraction.

The Rail Heritage Quarter will be the centrepiece of celebrations for the 2025 bicentenary of the Stockton & Darlington Railway and there are exciting plans in store.

There are several historically significant buildings on the site which will be linked together to create a cluster of attractions, including the Skerne Bridge, the oldest working railway bridge in the world.

Digital technology will bring history to life, including a new immersive ride experience. The Railway Heritage Quarter will have a café and shop, themed play area, show field, a new live engineering building - which is already making great progress - temporary exhibition and archive space and extended car parking, to attract all visitors of all ages for years to come.

While the Head of Steam building is closed, a number of regular events will be relocated. These include Station Scamps, school holiday activities, adult craft workshops, railway coffee mornings and the dementia café – keep up to date by visiting the Head of Steam website or following the museum on Facebook.

There will also be an outreach education programme, Museum on the Move, and hard hat tours of the site once building work is well-established. Details will be shared in later editions of One Darlington and on the Head of Steam Facebook page.



Have your say in council elections

Voting by post

Council elections take place in Darlington on Thursday 4 May, with all 50 council seats contested. Following the election, with the support of a majority of councillors, a leader and administration will take office for the next four years. Ten areas of Darlington will also have parish council elections.

If you've ever thought about standing for election, you can find out more on the Local Government Association's website www.local.gov.uk/be-councillor

Voting in the elections

To vote in the elections, you must be on the electoral register. If you are already registered, you don't need to do anything.

The easiest way to register to vote is online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. It takes five minutes and you will need your date of birth and National Insurance number. You need to register before midnight on Monday 17 April to vote in the next elections.

If you want to vote at a polling station you will need photo ID

Because of changes in law, you must show photo ID at a polling station. Acceptable forms of photo ID include:

- a UK passport, or one from the Channel Islands, Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state, or a Commonwealth country
- a UK driving licence, or one from the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state
- a Blue Badge
- a national identity card issued by an EEA state
- an older person's bus pass
- a disabled person's bus pass
- · a biometric immigration document
- an identity card bearing the proof of age standards scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- a Ministry of Defence form 90 (defence identity card).

The photo ID document need not be in date, but the photo must be a recognisable likeness to you.

If you don't have any of the photo ID listed, you can apply for a voter authority certificate to take to the polling station. Application forms are available from elections@darlington.gov.uk or call 406444.

If you have previously asked for a postal vote you do not need to do anything. To apply for a postal vote, please use the application form on the next page, or contact the elections team by calling 406444 or email elections@darlington.gov.uk Completed application forms must be received by 5pm on Tuesday 18 April.

The signature and date of birth you provide on the application form will be checked against the signature and date of birth you put down when you later complete the postal vote paperwork. We check all postal votes received.

Amy Edwards and her deputy Ella Wallace, both 10, attended a cross party climate change working group meeting to explain to councillors what their environmental visions for Darlington are.


Having spoken to other children, they were able to put forward lots of ideas including:

Children's services rated officially good!



Children's services have been rated good overall and outstanding in one area, by Ofsted, following its latest inspection.

The Ofsted report, praising services, follows a twoweek inspection, of all children's services, including safeguarding, children in care, care leavers, fostering and adoption. All services were found to be good overall, however inspectors rated the experiences and progress of children in care and care leavers outstanding.

Families are at the heart of our services

The report praises:

- the progress made to build a child focused service, providing effective help and protection and care to children and families across all levels of need, vulnerability, and risk
- strong political support, challenge, leadership, and accountability at every level
- good social work with professional, curious, and caring social workers
- detailed assessments ensuring the right help is provided at the right time so needs are met.

Councillor Jon Clarke, cabinet member for children and young people, said: "We are delighted with our latest Ofsted report. It is such a great read with so much positive feedback.

"In 2015, Ofsted rated children's services in Darlington as inadequate, and in 2018 as requires improvement, so for

all services to improve to good overall, and outstanding in one area, is a phenomenal achievement, bearing in mind we have had a pandemic, which made delivering services extremely challenging.

"We have an amazing team, and this latest report recognises the hard work and change of culture undertaken to ensure our most vulnerable children and families are always at the heart of all our work.

"We have such a great network of agencies who want children to experience the best of life in Darlington. It is critical to us that the children and families we support are given the opportunity to have their say on the services provided, and I am so pleased this was recognised.

"It is heart-warming for children leaving care to tell inspectors, due to being in care, they have been provided with many opportunities and skills they will carry with them their entire life.

"I meet regularly with staff and young people who use our services, and time after time, I am blown away by the respect, trust and great working relationships that are formed.

"Staff have undoubtedly climbed a mountain to achieve such fantastic results, they are amazing! However, we recognise there is always more to do, we are ambitious for the future and committed to continue to deliver the best services for all our children and young people to ensure they have the best experiences and aspire to their dreams and plans for their future."

The hard work, creativity and commitment of small businesses in the town has been recognised with Darlington ranked as the fourth most entrepreneurial town in the UK.

The number of small businesses in the town with up to 49 employees increased by 210 in 2022 - this goes against the national trend which has seen the number of small businesses in the country decrease by 83,000.

We took the opportunity to meet the people behind two of our most successful town centre businesses:

House of Zana

Amber Kotrri started House of Zana in 2018 as an online business specialising in handmade garments. She opened her first shop in Grange Road in November 2019.

During the pandemic she adapted her skills to make scrubs for NHS workers and is now dedicating herself to growing her business.

House of Zana has a strong ethical basis. Amber knows her suppliers and ensures everything is connected from her initial designs to the final products.

Amber said: "The council and community are so supportive. There is a lot happening in the area and a lot of excitement around. I grew up here but only really appreciated the town when I returned home after travels. A big factor of success here is the people who support our businesses."

Amber plans to launch her wholesale business later this year and expand internationally.



Hash and Hatch Luncheonette

Jasmin and Phil Robson expanded their 17 year old business, Hash Bar and Kitchen, to open Hatch Luncheonette in 2018 and Hatch To Go in 2021.

All three businesses are in the town centre, providing food, drinks and takeaways.

Jasmin said: "We use a lot of local suppliers for our take out shop and in our retail and gift area where we try to concentrate on sourcing local independent brands. The council has been approachable and open to ideas, for example expanding our outside seating, and that has helped us to grow. The town centre is also compact, meaning businesses are within easy reach for customers. We love helping Darlington become a better place to visit, as we live here."

Funding boost for ra

A huge injection of government money to the tune of £93m is ensuring ambitious plans to transform the station and the areas either side are well on track.

The funding from the Department for Transport is in addition to £33m committed by Tees Valley Combined Authority (TVCA) and £0.98m from the Towns Fund that will make Darlington a transport hub for the region.

We're supporting TVCA, Network Rail, LNER and other partners to transform the station area.

Once complete, this development will totally transform how people access and use the station. Additional platforms, tracks and signalling will increase rail capacity. A new station building, car parking and a transport interchange will be built on Neasham Road. Plans are also in place to create an attractive pedestrianised area, transport facilities and safety improvements on the Victoria Road side of the existing station building.

Hoardings now enclose the whole Neasham Road side of the site, giving a sense of the huge scale of the project.





il development plans

Some demolition work has already taken place and familiar buildings such as the Grey Horse pub, the East End Club, garages and take aways will soon make way for this exciting development.

Work to remove roads and underground services within the site area will also take place over coming months to prepare the ground for the new build.

This will include a new station building and platform along with a multi storey car park and a travel hub to make accessing the station by foot and cycle easier, alongside better connections to bus services.

On the Victoria Road side of the station, future demolitions are proposed beginning with Hogan's pub followed by a property on Pensbury Street. This will be the first phase of work to smooth out the sharp bend in front of the station building to

create wider paved areas making the station safer for pedestrians.

Work is also well underway on the temporary car park on the site of the old cattle market. Once complete this will replace the existing LNER car park on the Neasham Road side of the station. The temporary car park will be in use until the new multi storey car park opens.

Work on the existing station building and track work will start in 2023. All work on the project is set to be completed in 2025.

Some footpaths along Neasham Road have already been closed and diversions are in place - please follow the signs and avoid walking along busy roads. As work progresses there will be further road and footpath closures. We will try to keep disruption to a minimum.

The council's budget for the next financial year and the four year medium term financial plan (MTFP) are out for public consultation.

The council has faced significant financial challenges over the last decade as the government has responded to the worldwide economic downturn.

This has been made worse by the conflict in Ukraine, with huge increases in inflation, rising utility costs and growing demand for services particularly in relation to social care, for both adults and children.

Almost two thirds of the council's budget is spending within these two areas and this is expected to increase further in future years.

The council has performed well in responding to the financial challenges and has made savings and efficiencies in order to ensure that it is still able to deliver and invest in services for the businesses and residents of Darlington.

This MTFP allows for net revenue investment of more than £118m in the coming year, along with capital investment in our schools, roads, housing and community assets of £111m over the life of this plan, creating further opportunities for growth and investment within our borough.

The chancellor announced within his autumn statement in November that councils would have further flexibilities in setting their Council Tax and social care precepts.

The proposals in this plan include a 2.99% increase to Council Tax for 2023/24 and to continue to fund vital social care services a further 2% increase in the social care precept. Combined, the increase will be around half the current rate of inflation.

Once the consultation period has ended, the plan will be reviewed again and a final version will be voted on by all councillors in February.



Could you be a foster carer?



Our aim is to keep families together, however sometimes this is not possible

Sometimes we need to place children in foster care, with foster families who can provide a stable life for children and young people, particularly for teenagers, sibling groups and children with disabilities.

All foster carers receive an allowance to cover the cost of caring for a child and get paid for caring - the amount you will earn depends on your experience and on the ages and number of children you care for. You don't need any special qualifications, but must:

- be at least 21 years old
- · have a spare bedroom in your home
- provide a stable supportive environment, to ensure children in your care are happy and cared for

Types of foster care

There are many types of foster care. As part of your assessment, you will explore what type of fostering is best suited to your skills and experience:

Short term

You provide care for a child due to difficulties or illnesses in the family, offering a safe place and support when needed. This varies from an overnight stay to a few weeks or months.

Long term

Sometimes a child may need to live with a foster family for a longer period. Foster carers can help by offering a child the chance to grow up in a safe and supportive environment, if possible with the chance to keep in touch with their family.

Respite

Short placements to support other foster carers, for example if they need to have a holiday. This is a popular care option if you are unable to commit to full time foster care and some foster carers choose respite care in addition to other types of fostering.

Parent and child placement

You offer a place to a parent or parents with a young child to enable them to stay together. You support the parent/s to develop the skills they need to care for their child.

Siblings

We try to keep family members together whenever possible and urgently need more people who can provide care for sibling groups.

Supported Lodgings

You offer the next step to independence for young people aged 16–21 years who are leaving care, offering them a place in your home, and supporting and encouraging them to develop independent living skills, for when they feel ready to live on their own.

Human cost of fly-tipping

We all know fly-tipping not only spoils our environment and costs time and money to clear up, but have you ever considered the human cost?

That old fridge-freezer or chest of drawers blocking the footpath means people using a wheelchair or with a pram or pushchair can't get past. It's also a real danger to anyone blind or partially sighted.

We're working hard to tackle the issue, but we can't do it alone, we need you to take responsibility for your waste.

If you pay someone to remove your rubbish, it's up to you to make sure it's disposed of properly — if it's dumped you could be fined even if you paid someone in good faith! Always check the person has a waste carrier licence, issued by the Environment Agency, and ask for a waste transfer note.

You can check they are licensed at environment.data.gov.uk/public-register

More than 1,100 young people have been helped to find a job or full-time education thanks to the Darlington Youth Employment Initiative (YEI), since it started in 2016.


YEI participants have gone on to find work with a range of employers including Aldi, Drive Vauxhall, EE, Student Loans Company, Babul's restaurant, designer clothes store Flannels and furniture re-use charity Frade.

Programme co-ordinator Steven Winterburn said: "The YEI is an essential service in Darlington – we have employability tutors, business development staff and support workers.

"Our business development staff attend job fairs and careers events, developing relationships with local employers and match participants to jobs.

"The tutors help the young people with their employability skills, CVs, interview technique and confidence building.

"The support worker helps with other issues such as homelessness or addiction. Addressing those barriers helps make a person more ready for work." **Lewis Green, 19, Aldi:** "YEI helped me in lots of ways and were not forceful, suggesting a course which fitted what I wanted to do. They explained all the benefits and now I am working thanks to their help."



Connor Cooper, 18, Frade: "The support from YEI has made such a big difference for me. They helped to highlight how the Frade apprenticeship would help me, both in the short and long term."





For the latest instalment in our series of articles looking at the various teams that make up the council's adult social services, we spent time with the adult learning disability team.

The team supports around 500 adults and their carers, with the aim of helping them to be as independent as possible.

Team manager Julie Hopkinson explains: "We are a small, tight-knit and resilient team and we're great at using our creativity to meet challenges head on when they arise.

"We carry out assessments, reviews and reassessments and develop support plans with individuals, to support them to achieve positive outcomes for themselves."

Councillor Lorraine Tostevin, cabinet member for adults, said: "I've seen first hand how hard this team works, and how dedicated everyone is to helping deliver a great service for the people they work with.

"The learning disability team is another important piece in the jigsaw of our adult social services."

No two days are the same for members of the learning disability team, so this is just a snapshot of what a typical day could look like for one of the team's social workers.

"The first thing I do when I log on in the morning is check my emails, phone calls and voicemails and look out for any safeguarding concerns, which helps me to plan the day ahead.

"I attend the team meeting, followed by a daily drop in with colleagues in the adult community learning disability health team to discuss an individual both teams are supporting. Next, I receive a phone call from a family I am working with requesting some urgent support to help them to maintain their caring role. I take a holistic approach to identify if there any issues with the individual or carer's mental and physical health which may be contributing to the change in their situation.

"After discussing it with my manager I arrange a home visit to gather further information and undertake a reassessment. I know the individual well and am greeted with a high-five which is part of their communication and helps them feel confident. I sit with the family and gather updated information to identify what is contributing to the current situation.

As part of this I complete a mental capacity assessment to establish if the individual is able to make the particular decision required. As they currently lack capacity around their care and support needs, in conjunction with their family, a 'best interest' decision was made. I involve the individual in the assessment process as much as possible, with their family advocating the person's views on their behalf. A short break stay was agreed to be in the person's best interest to support the carer to maintain their caring role.

"Due to the individual's care needs, a specialist placement was required. The team support each other closely, so two workers link up to split the work in contacting different specialist providers to see who can best support the individual. I contact occupational therapy so they can assess if any specialist equipment is needed and is in place, so the individual is supported safely during the short break.

I know the individual well and am greeted with a high-five which is part of their communication and helps them feel confident.

"I work with the individual and their family to ensure they have everything they need for their stay including clothing, personal items and arrange for medication through their GP. I arrange transport to collect the individual from their home.

"The family is struggling financially and so I provide them with contact details for the local food banks to ensure they have basic provisions for the week.

"We then arrange a multi-disciplinary team meeting which will bring together all the professionals, the person's family, and support network, to develop an action plan to ensure the person and their independence remains central to decision making going forward.

"It is important at the end of the day, to debrief with my team so we are all updated and to support our own wellbeing."





Work is underway on the next phase of a major project to create a walking and cycling route between the town centre and the west of Darlington.

The changes to Duke Street will formalise the one-way traffic system and 20mph speed limit introduced in 2020, as well as adding a dedicated contraflow cycle lane on the south side of the street and widened pavements on the north side to allow for better pedestrian access.

Duke Street is home to a large number of independent businesses, which will all remain open throughout the works. There will always be pedestrian access along the length of the street and the site team will work closely with business owners to allow for deliveries.

The work will take place in two phases, with each planned to take five months due to the need to maintain access at all times.

The aim is to make cycling and walking easier for shorter journeys, as well as making Duke Street safer with the introduction of speed tables at junctions and pedestrian crossing points.

The project is part of the wider £1.7m scheme, funded by the Tees Valley Mayor and the Tees Valley Combined Authority, which has already seen improvement works to Woodland Road and Outram Street.

We are working with StreetLink, a non-profit organisation that provides a link between someone rough sleeping and support services in their area.

Reports are sent to our housing options team and an outreach service, delivered by the 700 Club. All reports are followed up by physical contact with the reported person and appropriate support is offered.

Holocaust Memorial Day



Make RECYCLING RIGHT your New Year's resolution!

Our crews regularly attend blazes where rubbish and wheelie bins have been deliberately set on fire.

These fires delay our crews from getting to emergencies, can quickly get out of hand and lead to much bigger fires.

You can help to reduce the fire risk by following some simple steps:



Make it thin to fit in the bin - flatten packaging and squeeze the air out of plastic bottles so they fit in your recycling bin or bag and don't spill out.



If possible, put your bins out on the morning of your collection, and bring them back onto your property as soon as possible after they've been emptied.



Think about where and when you dispose of your rubbish and recycling. It may be waste to you, but it's fuel to an arsonist.



If you regularly have more recycling than will fit in your bin, contact the council and they will get you another bin free of charge. Try not to leave extra recycling next to your bin. If possible, store it until the next collection day or take it to the household waste recycling centre on Whessoe Road which is open every day except Christmas Day and New Year's Day (weather permitting).
