The Bread and Butter Thing









Over the course of the last few months, The Bread and Butter Thing, a charity aimed at reducing food waste has been working wonders throughout Darlington.

Weekly hubs have been set up at Skerne Park, Firth Moor, Harrowgate Hill, Branksome, Red Hall as well as brand new site in Eastbourne Park which opened in April 2021.

TBBT's affordable food service means that for just £7.50, members receive food goods worth a minimum of £35. Each week members get a bag of fresh fruit and veg, chilled items for the fridge like meat or dairy products and also a bag of staples such as pasta, rice and snacks. The food varies from week to week depending on what's available from suppliers but it's always good quality and value for money.

With different collections in different areas of the town families do not have to travel far and with a weekly pick up it can be used again and again.

The charity is supported by volunteers which have included housing officers, councillors, MP's and employees of local schools.

Following the success of the donation of laptops to Skerne Park earlier this year the housing department used their engagement fund to donate 75 laptops to local schools in Darlington.

7 schools which included Red Hall, St John's, St George's, Whinfield, The Education Village, Holy Family and St Teresa's were given the laptops for children of council tenants to help aid home working after what has been a difficult year for all.

The laptops are part of a scheme by housing tenancy management to find out more about families of young children and what matters most to them moving forward and how DBC can assist.

As part of her role this year Rachel is keen to engage with communities in her area.


'With all the restrictions in place this year customer engagement has been difficult but I will be looking at ways to interact with everyone virtually before things start to open up later in the year.

Praise for staff providing 'Lifeline' to residents

Council staff have been praised for providing an essential 'Lifeline' to residents across Darlington, particularly amid the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic.

More than 3,360 residents rely on support from the council's Lifeline team, which gives users the freedom to live independently with the added security of knowing that help is always there if needed. If you are living alone, unwell or caring for someone Lifeline could be the service for you.

Councillor Kevin Nicholson, Darlington Borough Council's cabinet member for health and housing, said:

"Our Lifeline team does an extraordinary job; they are always available to support our residents all year round. Our Lifeline programme helps people to have independent lives and gives confidence that should you need help, it is only a call away.

"Throughout the pandemic our Lifeline staff have been on the frontline doing an exceptional job. It is staggering to see that the team has received 47,417 calls for support so far this year and have attended 3,934 incidents.

"I am proud of what they do for our communities, ensuring that the most vulnerable have a lifeline in these challenging times."

This year, between the start of January and the end of June, the Lifeline team has achieved the following:

Phone calls received - 47,417

Incidents attended - 3.934

Average response time - 12min 10seconds

New equipment installs - 241

Activities delivered - 748

Welfare calls made by scheme managers - 67,434

Early response and intervention can often mean that the Response Officers assist someone before their situation deteriorates, which can sometimes reduce the need for a hospital visit or admission.

The team has also taken additional steps to make sure that users have been kept as safe as possible during the pandemic, which have included ensuring all members of the team have had their second COVID vaccinations.

A roadmap has also been produced which reflects government guidance but is relevant to our group living settings. For example we have worked closely with our Move More team to restart our exercise classes and non-essential services such as private cleaners and hairdressers.

All of this for a cost of £5.98 per week with free installation and no extra cost per visit.

If you are working with Adult Social Care then the Lifeline Service can be assessed and referred for as part of the person's care plan and if someone is receiving a reablement service from RIACT they can also receive up to six weeks free Lifeline support.


Follow these helpful tips to protect yourself and your family from deadly CHIP PAN FIRES

ALWAYS

- Keep the oven, hob and grill clean a build up fat and grease can easily catch fir .
- Use a thermostat-controlled deep-fat fryer, which will make sure the fat doesn't get too hot.
- Dry the chips before putting them in the pan
- Test the temperature of the oil by putting in a small piece of bread. If the bread crisps up quickly the oil is ready.

NEVER

- Leave cooking unattended
- Fill the pan more than a third full with fat or oil
- Put food in the pan if the oil begins to give off smo e.
 Turn off the heat and leave the oil to cool otherwise it could catch fir



IF A PAN DOES CATCH FIRE

- Don't move it or throw water on it
- Do turn off the heat if you can do it safel





15 hours of fun for your 2 year old!



Did you know, your child could be entitled to 15 hours of free early education a week?

2 year olds living in families in receipt of certain benefits are eligible, as are 2 year olds who have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) or who attract Disability Living Allowance (DLA) and Looked After 2 year olds.

You do not have to buy additional hours or additional services in order to access your free early education place. Once you are eligible for free early education, you will remain eligible.

Your child will experience a varied and stimulating range of play and early learning activities, including:

- learning by playing and exploring;
- creative and critical thinking;
- socialising and making friends; and
- having fun, in a safe and nurturing environment.



A day in the life: Becci Gardner-Queen

Housing Team Leader

In a particularly busy time for the Housing Team Becci gives us an insight into her day to day working life.

What does your job entail?

I am responsible for the day to day operation of the Housing Tenancy Management team including Housing Officers and Housing Advisors who run the day to day tenancy issues across Darlington. This includes advertising and allocating vacant properties, inspecting empty properties and scheduling work.

We are also responsible of taking care of the estates through regular inspections and working with partner agencies.

I support the team to enable them to provide an efficient Housing Service.

What do you enjoy the most about your role?

I enjoy seeing our Housing Officers help to make the communities thrive for our residents and seeing the hard work that goes into this. Working in Housing is always rewarding as we rehouse people who may have found themselves in difficult situations, watching them succeed and sustain a successful tenancy is very satisfying.

I have worked at Darlington Borough Council for 17 years, starting as a Modern Apprentice in our Housing Options team. I thoroughly enjoyed this role and gained a lot of experience enabling me to become Housing Team Leader.

This year we will be continuing our Community Fund for worthwhile causes around the town

If you are a group of residents or leaseholders, or a voluntary or community group with a good idea that will make a difference to the lives of Darlington Council tenants and the wider community of council housing estates the Community Fund may be something which can be applied for.

Applications can be made for funding of upto £1000 and will go through a panel to determine which are successful.

Previous applications have included funds for projects such as the Roxby Rotavators a group of amateur gardeners within our vibrant sheltered scheme with the aim of improving the garden area in which they live. The residents worked alongside StreetScene and their Management Officer to secure funding which helped improved the overall horticulture of the complex.

In addition to this Roxby Court was given funding so that all of the scheme was given Deaf Awareness Training to assist with a hearing impaired tenant thanks to the community fund showing that an application can have a profound effect on residents lives.

Community walkabouts to return...

With restrictions lifting the Housing Team are looking to reintroduce regular estate inspections in all parts of the town.

Over the course of the summer comprehensive checks will be put in place with dates listed on the Housing Facebook Page to ensure that hotspots are regularly checked and cleared.

The Housing team will be joined by StreetScene and Civic Enforcement to crack down on problems area and we will be inviting local Councillors to maintain a relationship which will work for all parties.



We will also look at the possibility of inviting council tenants, who will provide vital information, once restrictions have fully lifted in the near future giving residents opportunity to suggest improvements to estates.

Inspections should normally last for approximately 1 hour and will concentrate on visual issues such as graffiti, garden rubbish, StreetScene issues and street signs.

Around the schemes

Lockdown restrictions ease

With lockdown restrictions easing in the last few months, we have been able to open the schemes in line with government guidance.

This has meant that residents have been able to interact socially and get back to some of the things that they love best including arts and crafts, gardening, exercise groups and much more. It's been a long time coming and brilliant to see.



Planned indoor entertainment and activities up to a maximum of 6 participants.

These are arranged and booked via a scheme manager and are subject to specific scheme capacity.

All Covid safe arrangements are in place and scheme managers will support any tenants that may be apprehensive



Organised physical activities delivered via Move More and booked via a scheme manager.

These sessions are for a maximum of 6 participants.

All Covid safe arrangements are in place and scheme managers will support any tenants that may be apprehensive



Up to 30 people limit outdoors and visitors welcome to use the outside areas for this but tenants and families are asked to arrange this via the scheme manager



Extra care only - Lunchtime meal to restart in the communal dining area.

The scheme manager will be working alongside the tenants, Making Space care and the catering team to arrange 6 person/two household sittings



Planned outdoor entertainment and events-to include Bingo, performances, gardening groups etc.

These are subject to specific scheme arrangements and weather permitting.

Scheme managers will regularly update tenants with 'what's on'



All non essential services such as private cleaners and hairdressers are welcome to restart their services to tenants homes.

All government and building guidelines must be adhered to and the scheme manager should be made aware of these visits to enable these to be managed safely
