New Council housing building programme announced

The Council is planning to build 1000 new homes over the next 10 years. Darlington is one of only a few Council's that have built new Council Housing in recent years and is one of an even smaller group of Council's that have used its Building Services as the main contractor for the building work. Having completed a programme of 160 new homes over three years the next programme has already got under way with Lancaster Way in Lingfield which will see 30 new homes built. These properties will offer the latest in modern living-all at an affordable rent. This includes 8 three bed houses, 4 four bed houses and 18 two bed flats. We will let you know about future developments as more sites are identified.

What does your job entail?

I have recently been recruited as Housing Team Leader responsible for managing the Housing Plus Team, Refugee & Asylum Services and Furniture package scheme. These are additional services which provide, assist and ensure tenants sustain their tenancies. Previous to this role I worked as a Tenancy Enforcement Officer for which I was responsible for dealing with nuisance & anti-social behaviour within council properties. At present I am managing all responsibilities until my last post has been recruited so my work is very varied at the moment.

Describe a typical day?

Spontaneous, every day is completely different as my role can bring many challenges.

I enjoy working within a busy service, thinking on my feet and having to problem solve often complex issues.

What did you do before joining the council?

I have worked at Darlington for 13 years however previous to my time at Darlington Borough Council I worked for a Housing Association in Middlesbrough managing a challenging and diverse range of housing issues. I also worked as an estate agent which is when I developed my interest and passion for housing related matters.

Future works to your Home

The Council is finalising its programme of capital works to Council housing stock for the next year. Set out below are the areas of major expenditure and where the work is likely to take place. Once the programme is confirmed by Full Council the programme of work will start in April 2019 and run through to the end of March 2020. Housing Staff will be in touch with affected tenants well in advance of work commencing.

- (a) Adaptations and lifts £150,000 budget is to deliver adaptations within the Council's housing stock to enable tenants with a disability to remain in their own home and live independently across the Borough and to complete any major works to passenger lifts within sheltered and extra care schemes.
- (b) Heating Replacement £950,000 to fund new condensing boiler and central heating upgrades. This work will predominantly be completed in the Park Place and Dodds Street areas. There will also be some miscellaneous properties which will be included in the programme.
- (c) Structural Repairs £500,000 has been set aside to address any structural issues that may be identified within the year.
- (d) Lifeline Services £50,000 is set aside to continue to provide upgrades to Lifeline equipment.
- (e) Repairs before Painting £100,000 will be invested in joinery repair works in anticipation of the cyclical external painting programme. This will predominantly be in Haughton, Springfield and Firthmoor areas.
- (f) Roofing £700,000 for the replacement of roofs, fascia's, soffits and rainwater goods together with the top-up of loft insulation where appropriate. The programme will primarily be in the Geneva Road Area.
- (g) Garages £50,000 will be invested in improvements to the Council's garage blocks which will include Nightingale Avenue and demolition of low demand garages in poor condition at Rise Carr.
- (h) External Works £300,000 will be used to provide new rear dividing fences and new footpaths to Council properties in various locations based on condition.

- Smoke Detectors £25,000 is required to replace existing hard wired smoke and heat detectors where systems are now 10 years old and reaching the end of their recommended lifespan.
- (j) Pavement Crossings £32,000 has been identified to fund pavement crossings and hard-standings across the Borough.
- (k) Replacement Door Programme £350,000 will be used to replace external doors with energy efficient composite doors in the Springfield Area.
- Window Replacement £500,000 has been identified to replace windows across the Borough with double glazed UPVC. These areas will be determined based on those in the poorest condition.
- (m) Internal planned maintenance £1.980m for the replacement of kitchens and bathrooms, rewiring of electrical systems and heating system upgrades where required. This work will predominantly be completed in Branksome. There will also be some miscellaneous properties which will be included in the programme.
- (n) Communal Works £100,000 is required to replace communal doors in the North Road area.



Digital roll out -An update



Work to introduce the new digital option for you to manage many aspects of your tenancy is now due to be introduced during February and March 2019. You will be able to get things done faster and as you can connect to your account outside of office hours. It means you can manage your account at your own convenience.

What will you be able to do?

- Check your current rent balance and transactions
- Print rent statements
- Make online payments
- Set up direct debits
- Report repairs

What you will be able to doin the future?

We are looking at introducing a repairs appointment system which will allow tenants to choose their appointment slots. This will form a second phase of development and will be available either later this year or early in 2020.


The survey took place at Red Hall Primary School where they held a Christmas Fair.




Results of the Customer Engagement Survey

The survey took place in November 2018 and featured in the last edition of Housing Connect. It was also available electronically. The purpose of the survey was to find out what interest tenants have in getting involved in the way the housing service is delivered.


We wanted to know if tenants knew that they could get involved and 70% of tenants said they did know.

What subjects are you most interested in?



When asked about how tenants would like to engage with the service by far the largest interest was in the use of digital channels such as Email and the internet. More traditional means of engagement such as meeting the Housing Officer and tenants meetings continue to feature but this clearly signals the ongoing shift in tenant preferences to digital means of communications. However, the results suggest that there will continue to be a need for a balanced range of means of communications but with digital playing an increasingly important role.

New garden waste collection service

The council's new garden waste collection service will be launched in April.

More than 3,100 of you have registered an interest in the 'opt in' service and will now be invited to pay the £35 annual fee online.

When you make your payment, we will deliver a new 240 litre wheeled bin to store your garden waste in. If you have a larger garden, you can buy extra bins, up to a maximum of four per property.

The new service will be selffunding, so there will be no extra costs to the council. We will offer a fortnightly collection for 30 weeks of the year, between April and November. More information is available online at **www.darlington.gov. uk/gardenwaste** where you can also pay your annual fee.

Did you know that there is a simpler and quicker way of providing documents?



Darlington Borough Council have introduced a new simple to use scanning station in the Customer Contact Centre in the Town Hall. This allows you to supply documents to us without queuing to see an advisor. A floorwalker will be available in the Contact Centre if you need assistance.
