Welcome to your spring edition of One Darlington! As the days grow longer and the first signs of warmer weather appear, there's plenty happening in our town to look forward to.



FULL STEAM AHEAD TO S&DR200



2025 is a very special year for Darlington as residents, historians and train lovers come together to celebrate 200 years since the first passenger journey on the Stockton and Darlington Railway (S&DR).

The S&DR200 festival begins in late March with All Change, a spectacular open-air event in Bishop Auckland combining dazzling projections, drones and up to 100 live performers bringing history to life at the Kynren site. Find out more at www.s&dr200.co.uk

The nine month festival has something for everyone, with highlights throughout the year including a recreation of the first journey on the S&DR by a newly commissioned replica of Locomotion No. 1.

Free large-scale outdoor events, exhibitions focusing on the history of railways, bringing together paintings of national significance, botanical and sensory installations, iconic locomotives, and newly commissioned artworks showcased in public spaces, libraries, and world-class museums. Hopetown Darlington is front and centre of this world-leading celebration, kicking off with Railway Pioneers – celebrating the rockstars of the past, the first of two free exciting exhibitions, running from Friday 4 April until Sunday 22 June.

Three iconic locomotives will be on show in the Exhibition Hall, showcasing the advancements of rail technology in the early 19th century as well as the engineering innovation which led to the opening of the S&DR.

Pen-y-Darren, designed by Richard Trevithick; Steam Elephant, designed by John Buddle and William Chapman and the original Locomotion No. 1, designed by George Stephenson, will be on show, giving visitors a unique opportunity to see these rail pioneers free under one roof. The exhibition is expected to attract visitors from across the UK and beyond so get your tickets quickly! Book your free tickets at www.hopetowndarlington.co.uk

A YEAR OF CELEBRATIONS

Railway Pioneers is just the start of the S&DR celebrations in Darlington. Following on from Railway Pioneers - celebrating the rockstars of the past, Hopetown will be hosting STEAM to the Future between Friday 11 July and Sunday 5 October. This exhibition follows the story of the early railways and looks to the future of rail travel including the use of greener solutions. Visitors will enjoy a fully immersive art installation by Studio Swine inspired by steam as a source of power and be invited to create a train for the 22nd century using virtual reality software.

Later in the year, The Whistle Stop, a touring exhibition, bringing together high quality reproductions of historic artefacts and documents from across the UK to showcase S&DR's history, will come to Darlington Library at Crown Street.

In September, we will welcome Ghost Train to the town centre – a free, one day festival featuring performers, live music and a procession of large scale art installations.

On 27 September, a newly renovated replica of Locomotion No. 1 and the passenger carriage Experiment will travel along sections of the original S&DR line and will be cheered across Skerne Bridge, the world's oldest railway bridge still in operation.



Town centre footfall data reflects an increase in visitors and the number of people using council owned, town centre car parks has also shown signs of improvement.

Business confidence is growing and significant investment in our town centre is helping to support a healthy, productive and vibrant business community.

Five big-named brands have also renewed their leases in the Cornmill Centre and the future of the iconic Binns department store has been secured.

Growing our economy and attracting more businesses to the town centre is a key priority. We remain committed to the ongoing development of the Yards and Skinnergate and other regeneration projects including transforming the former Northern Echo building into an adult skills centre and business workspace.

We are also committed to filling the few empty shops in the town centre and are among four early adopters of the government's High Street Rental Auction scheme which gives councils new powers to auction the leases of properties which have been vacant for more than a year, where the landlord has not taken sufficient steps to let their premises. We are currently considering the areas where the powers could be applied and will be consulting with residents in the future.

Your EV journey



Ownership and use of electric vehicles (EVs) is increasing as people look to play their part in tackling climate change and air pollution. It's predicted that in five years' time, there will be 50,000 plug-in vehicles in the Tees Valley. As a council, we are committed to becoming carbon neutral by 2040 and part of that ambition includes increasing the use of EVs over the coming years.

If you already own an EV or are thinking of buying one, there's lots of things to consider. How far will it go before it needs recharging, and where can I recharge my vehicle, are perhaps the main questions.

With these questions, and others in mind, we have devised a policy that explores some of these concerns and how we can work towards finding effective and safe solutions to help more people enjoy the benefits of owning an EV.

New house builds are now required to offer an EV charging point and there are many options available for people who have driveways and need to install

a charging point. However, many of the borough's houses do not have a driveway to charge their EV at home. Cables stretched across the street or channels dug into pavements are not suitable solutions.

Accessible community charging points will help to solve this issue as will the increasing number of charging points at workplaces and supermarket car parks. Faster charging technology will mean that you can charge your car whilst doing your weekly shop. It is anticipated that some of these solutions will be funded by central government through Local Electric Vehicle Infrastructure which will be accessed through the Tees Valley Combined Authority (TVCA).

We've already worked with the TVCA to install around 50 charging points across seven of our town centre off street car parks, offering more choice for where you can charge your car.

Technology is constantly changing, and we will update our policy as needed. The policy is available in the highways section of our website.

Let's Talk with Trisha

The tragic loss of a family friend prompted lollipop lady Trisha English to form a local support group for people struggling with their mental health.

Let's Talk takes place at the Willow Community Centre on Willow Road, on the last Sunday of the month from 5pm until 7pm. Anyone is welcome, it's free and on a drop-in basis with free refreshments.

Trisha, 46, a busy mum of four and grandmother of eight, talks about the group:

"The sudden loss of our family friend was a real shock to us all. He had talked about ending his life but it was something we thought would never happen. It was this that made me think that there needs to be more support locally for people like him. I spoke to my local church, and they were really helpful and the idea of Let's Talk was born.

"I run the group with the help of local councillor David Beckett who is a trained counsellor as well. "We have any number from one to around ten turn up to chat and share their feelings. It's not a formal group but a safe space where people can say things in confidence without fear of judgement.

"A 'talking cushion' is passed around in each session – the only person who can talk is the one holding the cushion – this gives everyone the chance to talk without being interrupted.

"We offer information on where people can get extra help and advice as well as other support such as food banks.

"I've never done anything like this before and it was scary at first but it's worth it if we can make a difference to even one person.

"Anyone is welcome to come along to our monthly meetings, just turn up or feel free to email me first."

Get work in one week!

A couple of months ago 20-year-old Charlie Hawkins had nowhere to live and no job. Now, an exciting initiative from Learning & Skills is helping him, and others, to turn their lives around and get work in as little as one week!

Working together with local employers including Arriva, Aldi, Blackwell Grange Hotel, and several care homes, Learning & Skills offers a series of one-week, bespoke employment courses offering guaranteed interviews upon completion. The free employment academy courses equip people with the basic skills required for a career in care, customer services, hospitality or warehousing and are helping to build people's confidence and give them the skills they need to be successful at interview.

The courses have been running since 2022 and have supported over 182 individuals, including Charlie, into employment.

Charlie said: "I was unemployed and going through a tough time. I haven't got any formal qualifications, don't like being in big groups and have really low confidence. Staff on the course were really supportive. They met me on the first day and helped me to settle into the classroom as well as quietly checking in with me throughout the course.

"The confidence and interview techniques sessions also helped me to talk about myself in a positive way. Because the course was taught in the workplace, I got to see first-hand what working at Blackwell Grange would be like and got to meet the recruiting manager which helped me to feel more confident at interview.

"I was really happy to be offered a job as a commis chef and now work four shifts a week. I'm looking into starting a professional cooking qualification and am saving up for my own set of knives and to live independently."

She said: "The courses are great for anyone wanting to learn a new skill or explore their interests and hobbies in a relaxed and informal atmosphere. Because it's free, I've been able to join in without worrying about the cost and I've learned lots of techniques which I've been trying out at home.

"The courses have also had a positive impact on my mental health. As someone who experiences anxiety and social anxiety, it's been good to come along to a small group and meet people with similar



interests. It's helped to develop my confidence and social skills and has spurred me on to look for another, in person course, to study in the future."

New platform launched to report allergic reactions

CONTAINS NUTS

Twelve councils across the North East have come together to launch an online platform where people can report if they have had an allergic reaction after eating in a food business.

The platform, which is hosted by Redcar & Cleveland Borough Council, makes it easier for people across the region to report incidents where they suspect they have been exposed to a known allergen and for the appropriate environmental health teams to investigate and take action where necessary.

All food businesses should have controls in place within their kitchen to cater for people with allergies safely. However, a regional survey carried out in 2023 revealed that more than one in three 'allergen-free' samples taken contained traces of allergens.

Food allergies are very serious and potentially lifethreatening. Symptoms can range from mild itchy skin and swollen lips, face or eyes, to vomiting, abdominal pain and anaphylaxis - which causes around 20 deaths each year in the UK. A person can experience anaphylaxis within a few seconds or minutes of eating, or being exposed to, food allergens – most commonly found in peanuts, tree nuts, cow's milk, egg, fish and shellfish, and sesame seeds/sesame oil.

Brian Whelan, environmental health manager, said: "Most food businesses prepare their food safely and manage risks well. However, sometimes things go wrong. This new website gives customers across the North East a simple system to report any allergic reactions which will help environmental health teams to identify businesses where allergen controls are not properly in place; increasing consumer safety and reducing the risk of allergic reactions occurring accidentally."

Tackling the sale of illegal vapes



Borough Council



Our trading standards officers have been working hard with regional partners to tackle illegal vapes, following a rise in the number of complaints of sales to children as young as 12.

Due to easy accessibility and affordability, there has been a general increase in young people purchasing vapes and cigarettes for their own use. Many of the sellers identified had no concerns over who they sold them to and would often sell illegal and over-strength vapes to young children.

While you may think there's no harm in buying a cheaper alternative, they are often full of untested, harmful and illegal chemicals. There are also concerns that the sale of illegal vapes is connected to organised crime and the exploitation of children or other vulnerable people.

Operation Nightstar saw trading standards join forces with officers from Durham Constabulary and the North East regional organised crime unit, the police and crime commissioner's office, public health, our licensing and civic enforcement teams and other local councils to target shops selling illegal vapes and tobacco.

Dozens of premises in Darlington were inspected and illegal goods seized from 28 individual retailers – some on multiple occasions. The teams also looked at vehicles and private homes, which are often used as off-site storage.

While this operation has now drawn to a close, trading standards continue to work closely with other agencies to tackle the issue, conducting further test purchases, visits and seizures of illegal goods. We would urge anyone with information or concerns about illegal vapes being sold to report it – only by working together can we stop this trade altogether.

Achieving the DSFQ means staff have the knowledge and skills to provide healthy balanced meals for children and young people.

The award has enabled the team to understand the benefits of a balanced diet, food preparation, positive eating environments, eating sustainability, for example making recipes with seasonal fruit and much more.

The qualification involves a maximum of eight hours of learning over two months, all of which can be completed at the participant's own pace.

Kelly Hodgson, Darlington College nursery manager said: "We are delighted to have achieved this Learning & Skills School Food Catering Award,



the staff all completed this qualification via an online portal and were able to work through it at their own pace. The course was informative, easy to follow, and gave us new ideas. Following the course, we revisited our menus to ensure we offer healthy, balanced, nutritious meals.

"We have also decided to organise cooking activities for the children, to help them learn more about food and nutrition."

All dogs bark sometimes, but constant barking and whining can disturb or annoy your neighbours and may be classed as a noise nuisance.

Last year alone our environmental health team received 359 noise complaints about barking dogs – that's nearly one each day and equates to a whopping 40% of all the noise complaints we received in 2024.

Ahead of Noise Awareness Day and Noise Action Week we're asking you to do what you can to keep noise from your dog to a minimum including:

- training your dog as early as possible to prevent them developing bad habits
- making sure your dog has adequate exercise, is not bored and has play time
- not leaving your dog outside if they are barking to get back in
- gradually getting your dog used to being alone by putting them into another room for a few minutes at a time
- walking and feeding your dog before you go out and making sure they have a comfortable bed and toys available
- turning the radio on low if your dog is comforted by hearing human voices
- screening doors and windows if your dog barks to join in with things happening outside
- not leaving your dog for long periods where possible and if you have to, asking someone to pop round to walk them or let them outside briefly.

Remember, dogs which are kept outside are often the cause of complaints so think carefully before you leave your dog alone in a yard or garden.

We have an incredibly dedicated fostering service and what all our foster carers do for our children and young people in their care is invaluable and so rewarding for both parties.

Foster carers truly make a difference in people's lives.

Glynne dedicated 39 years of her life to helping children in need and in this time, she supported 81

local children, 73 of them living in her home. Some are still in contact with her today - a testament to her time and the relationships she built.

We met up with Glynne and her daughters Alana and Roxana to thank her for her hard work, kindness and dedication to our fostering service and here is what she had to say:

"It has been a pleasure to have been a foster carer for Darlington Borough Council, and it's with great sadness that I've decided my time must end, after looking after 81 children over the past 39 years.

"Being a foster carer is such a rewarding job, it's allowed me to help shape the lives of the children and guide them onto their next steps, whether that be returning home, long-term foster care or being adopted.

"Fostering comes with difficulties – it can be heartbreaking when children move on, but reassuring, knowing they are moving into the next chapter of their lives.

"The past 39 years have been wonderful, I have been supported by a great team of social workers and met other lovely foster carers and some amazing children, and their families."

She added: "If I were younger I would do it all again in a heartbeat."

SEND inspection outcome

Children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) are 'valued, visible and included', inspectors have found.

Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission visited Darlington to check on services for young people with SEND. Darlington has seen improvements to services for children with SEND since its previous inspections in 2022.

The council and the North East and North Cumbria Integrated Care Board (ICB) are jointly responsible for the planning and commissioning of services for children and young people with SEND.

The report said children and young people with SEND have a voice in Darlington. They are valued, visible and included in their communities. Children, young people and their families are included in decisionmaking about the individual support plans and types of support that they receive.

There are many positives about the partnership's SEND arrangements and the experiences and outcomes for children and young people with SEND.

Some of the areas of strength the report highlighted include:

- The partnership is ambitious for children and young people with SEND. Leaders work closely together to improve local provision.
- The timeliness and quality of children and young people's education, health and care plans are improving.
- Children and young people who are in care, and have SEND, are successfully prepared for adulthood.

The report also highlighted areas where the partnership must improve, including:

- Leaders need to continue to develop how they use data to inform strategic planning.
- Children and young people wait too long for some therapy services and a diagnosis for autism and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.
- There is a lack of a defined process to assess and support children and young people with a learning disability.

The partnership already recognises and is responding to these challenges. The partnership had developed a new SEND Strategy to be adopted this year and completed a full public consultation on the strategy last year.

Teesside Airport's Backing Our Major Businesses

Three huge announcements have recently shown how Teesside Airport is working for Darlington's business community and workers, as well as local passengers.

Global technology giant Amazon has chosen Darlington as the location for its first UK's drone deliveries in a major international coup for the region.

Amazon has confirmed that its Darlington fulfilment centre will host the maiden UK flights of Prime Air – its drone-based delivery service.

This will see autonomous drones carry out same-day 30-minute deliveries from warehouse to customers' homes.

The project – one of just a handful globally – has been secured following extensive and detailed work between Amazon, Teesside International Airport and the Tees Valley Mayor over 18 months.



Planning permission and authorisation from the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) for the lightweight delivery service will now be sought ahead of the start of operations.

Long-standing tenant Draken has also cemented its future at the airport after agreeing a new deal with the Ministry of Defence.

The company has confirmed it will renew its agreement with the MOD – securing its Teesside operations for another four years after the firm signed a new £173million contract with the MoD to support military training with the RAF.

It will also see Draken – which has been based at the airport for 25 years – enrol a share of 12 apprentices in Darlington.

The region's reputation as a growing centre for aircraft maintenance has received another big boost after aviation firm Willis secured a second deal with a major airline.

TUI, one of the UK's largest operators, has signed a long-term agreement with Willis Aviation to see maintenance services carried out on its narrow-body aircraft at Teesside.

The deal comes hot on the heels of Willis signing a deal with carrier Jet2 to carry out in-depth "C-check" inspections on its Boeing 737s.

The company leases Hangar 2 at the airport as its base for aircraft maintenance, storage, and disassembly. It has also secured planning permission to also expand its operations at Teesside in aircraft Maintenance, Repair, and Overhaul.

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
